READINGS FOR SUNDAY January 14, 2024 Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: 1 Sm 3:3b-10 Second Reading: 19/1 Cor 6:13c-15a Gospel: 17-20/Jn 1:35-42

FOCUS: The Lord invites us to come and stay a while with him.

What are we looking for in Jesus? Are we looking for a teacher, as the disciples were? A problem-solver? A miracle-worker? Whatever it is that our hearts are seeking, the Lord, the Lamb of God, present here in the Eucharist, invites us to come and stay a while with him. If we dare do so, we, like Andrew, might come to know who Jesus truly is and be transformed by his presence.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: The Lord calls Samuel for the first time, but Samuel does not know him. Eli recognizes what is happening and tells Samuel how to answer: *Speak, for your servant is listening*. Paul exhorts the Corinthians to avoid immorality, reminding them that they are united to Christ and their bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. In the Gospel, John the Baptist directs two of his disciples toward Jesus, who invites them to stay with him. Andrew, one of the two, seeks his brother Simon and brings him to Jesus.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

In "What's Wrong with the World?" the British Catholic novelist G.K. Chesterton writes: "The Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found difficult, and left untried." Such is the nature of perfection; the human attempt to attain it will always fall short, but this needn't mean that we should abandon the enterprise. We call "saints" our fellow human beings in whose hearts dwells the love of Christ, which propels them to take his words seriously, and themselves...not so much. I have written before about critics of the Church—Mark Twain and G. B. Shaw-who yet regard St. Joan of Arc as the most extraordinary human being who ever lived. Why? Because she lived a life of utter authenticity before the world. Twain saw her as an example of unpar-

alleled virtue in an age drowning in vice; Shaw saw her as a woman with a spark of divine fire who, like Socrates before her, indicted the authorities of her age simply by her example.

This week the Church honors St. Antony of Egypt, the Father of Christian monasti-

cism. He is another example of someone who, by the grace of God, lived as best he could, according to the ideal of Gospel perfection. But before we examine his life, it is important to recall an essential aspect of Catholic piety, what we call the "senses" of Scripture. We can review this idea in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (#115-120) which explains two ways of reading the Bible. These are the literal meaning (words at their face value), and the spiritual meaning, which is itself divided into three levels: the allegorical, the moral, and the anagogical or "mystical" meaning. Although the literal meaning is the foundation of the other meanings, it also lends itself to different interpretations and thus, apparent contradictions. The spiritual meanings, by contrast, go beneath the surface of the letter of Scripture, where we find greater consensus, the result being that different people may be obedient ("listen") to the Word of God while not living in rigid uniformity with each

other. The four senses of Scripture refer to "deeds, faith, how to act, and our divine destiny." And so, St. Louis of France (a king), St. Joan of Arc (a soldier), and St. Antony (a monk) all took seriously the commandments of Christ, although they lived vastly different lives.

St. Antony is one of those rare individuals who, like St. Francis of Assisi after him, understood the words Jesus spoke to the rich young man—"If you would be perfect, go and sell what you have and give to the poor...then come and follow me (Mt. 19:21)"—as a direct order. Born to a wealthy landowner, Antony cared for his younger sister after the death of his parents, and after securing her future, did exactly what Jesus demanded of the man in the Gospel. In the solitude of the desert, he did battle with Satan as did Jesus (Mt. 4:1-11). In "The

> Sayings of the Desert Fathers," Antony gives us three precepts of the spiritual life: "Whoever you may be, always have God before your eyes; whatever you do, do it according to the testimony of the holy Scriptures: in whatever place you live, do not easily leave it." Words to live by, surely: prayer, the lifting up of the soul to

God, is central to the spiritual life, as is listening to his Word in the Bible. But what about the last direction, not to be anxious to leave where you live? I remember Mother Teresa cautioning her admirers not to think they must follow her to Calcutta to serve Christ, but to find him at home, doing "little things with great love." Those of us who have lived in many places experience the temptation of "spiritual wanderlust": the need for fulfillment elsewhere, in unusual things and strange places, when Christ is waiting for us in the mundane and the familiar. The criterion by which to test all things is to observe their result. As Antony writes: "I no longer fear God, but I love him, for love casts out all fear" (1 Jn. 4:18).

Samuel grew up, and the Lord was with him, not permitting any word of his to be without effect. What's another way of saying this was Samuel's calling?


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

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
