The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

When was the last time your dentist made a house call for you? Recently, I asked my dentist (my brother!) about some discomfort I was experiencing, and instead of me having to make the trek to his office, he stopped off at the rectory to "take a look." As it turns out, all was well; the area just needed some time to heal. Why is it that, once a professional reassures you, the pain immediately disappears, as if by magic? One suspects that, because he has been my dentist since... forever...I immediately responded to the knowledge and expertise he brings to the situation. On an infinitely more important level, is it our practice, when addressing an affair of the heart, or a dilemma, or the search for meaning and peace, to turning

instinctively to Christ for his wisdom and healing grace?

The last line of the Gospel for the 3rd Sunday of Lent is telling: "Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew

them all, and did not need anyone to testify about human nature. He himself understood it well." One marvels at this statement; the Evangelist stresses the divine knowledge of Our Lord when dealing with limited and/or sinful human beings. After his display of righteous indignation in the Temple, we read that "many began to believe in his name..." Nevertheless, Jesus resists the temptation that goes with the adulation of the crowds. His constant prayer is at the heart of his complete conformity to the will of his Father.

As for us, whose limitations prevent us from attaining that utter submission to God, the Church speaks of two (among several) forms of grace: *sufficient*, which is the ability to obey God and do good—although we may *not*—and *efficacious*, which always results in a happy outcome. In our

series on Ignatian Spirituality, we explored the notion of *agere contra*—acting against—our sinful tendencies, so that the pull of temptation might diminish over time. If we are tempted by: food, then we fast; by gossip, we bestow a compliment or a blessing, or say nothing at all; by assuming the worst of others, we give the benefit of the doubt, etc. This begs the question: how does one arrive at that level of virtue and kindness?

Once again, as we discussed last week, the issue is...humility. St. Ignatius lists three types, all of which are saving, but which admit of varying degrees. The first one means that I so humble myself before God that, whatever the temptation, I never consent to mortal (deadly) sin. All Catholics

must so consent. But can we do better? Of course we can. I so humble myself that I refuse to commit even venial (less serious sin), and remain indifferent to whatever comes into my life, whether riches or poverty, honor or dishonor, etc. This is "more" perfect, but can we do even

better? Yes. If it would please God, and help us attain perfection, to *prefer* poverty to riches, dishonor to honor, etc. This, again, is the mentality of *agere contra*: that we deliberately act against whatever could compromise our complete docility to the will of God. Of course, we recognize that this is a special grace, given only to extraordinary individuals: St. Antony in the Desert, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Ignatius himself. Nevertheless, we do well to *aspire* to such holiness, whatever the outcome. Humility and forgiveness are the simplest, and most difficult, virtues to attain. If we go to the Physician of our Souls—Christ—we can be sure he will heal us.

READINGS FOR SUNDAY

March 3, 2024 Third Sunday in Lent

First Reading: Ex 20:1-17 or 20:1-3, 7-8, 12-17

Second Reading: 1 Cor 1:22-25

Gospel: Jn 2:13-25

FOCUS: Have zeal for the dwelling place of the Lord.

Jesus has such reverence for the temple, God's dwelling place, that he overturns tables and drives away those who are abusing its true purpose. This place here, where we are gathered and will receive Jesus in the Eucharist, is God's dwelling place as well. Let us allow Jesus to cleanse our hearts and our minds, that he might renew us as his dwelling place, his temple.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the first reading, God delivers his commandments. Paul explains to the Corinthians that the challenge the Gospel poses to Jews and Gentiles is also the power and wisdom of God to those who receive it. In the Gospel, Jesus drives the money changers out of the temple. When questioned about this, Jesus says he would rebuild the temple in three days if it was destroyed. Later, his disciples understood this to be a prediction of his resurrection
