# The Pastor's Page

#### Dear Friends:

You may have read about the upsetting incident that occurred two weeks ago at St. Patrick's Cathedral, in which a funeral for an ostensibly Catholic person was hijacked by protesters. An ugly, chaotic demonstration broke out, while raging "mourners" directed their full fury at the Church and its teachings.

Leave it to the usual suspects, including a priest, to say that it was "wonderful" that St. Patrick's allowed the event, without ever objecting in the least to the uncivilized behavior it witnessed. Even critics of the protest blunted their own effort in standing up to religious intolerance. Nicholas Sawicki writes: "What caused this travesty was the

radical culture of individualism that pervades our society and was made manifest during the funeral." I beg to differ. It was naked, hostile bigotry, the kind that would never be tolerated toward any other group.

Fr. Pius Parsch was a religious order priest born in what is now the Czech Republic, who devoted himself to the study and renewal of Catholic liturgy. Despite having died years before the Second Vatican Council, he was yet influential for inspiring many reforms, including the practice of the priest facing the congregation, and a return to the celebration of liturgical seasons, hence, the title of his famous work, *The Church's Year of Grace*. He has this to say about the significance of rose-colored vestments on *Laetare* Sunday:

The Church now chooses the loveliest flower of spring, the early rose, and brings it into God's house and into the liturgy. The rose is the image of the soul in grace. The queen of flowers, it blossoms on its stem of thorns.

The soul too is surrounded with thorns, the thorns of a world that God once cursed, the thorns of original sin. Yet in spite of these it is raised up to the glory of grace; to grace that is clothed, red as a rose, in the mantle of love...

Our faith has a genuine appeal, for it addresses the "tragic" aspect of the human condition, that is, our fallenness. Misusing the great spiritual power of free will, the human family rebelled against God in the form of "radical individualism," a move that, ironically, ended in even greater alienation: from God, neighbor, creation, and even oneself.

Lent, to be sure, recalls human sinfulness, but always within the context of an even greater reality: the love and forgiveness of God. As with all great tragedy, it focuses on (an otherwise "fatal") flaw; it draws the community through pity and sympathy to the "hero" (the sinless Christ); and it results in

a "purging" (salvation) of the soul. Far from cock-eyed optimists, Catholics understand the world realistically, yet they also detect the divine will at work in the vicissitudes of history. They may feel the prick of the thorns of sin, but they fix their eyes firmly on the Rose (Heaven). Like Dante, they see their destiny; the redeemed form the petals arranged around the (now white) Mystic Rose, and behold the sight of God:

My vision in the vastness and the height Lost not itself, but comprehended all The quantity and quality of that gladness.

**Thursday** – Draw a picture of Jesus with His Crown of Thorns


<u>Friday</u> – Say an Act of Contrition Prayer, ask your parents to take you to confession

### For God so Loved the World

When God made the world He wanted the people to be His friends and always live in happiness. But instead of choosing to love God completely, the people sinned. They were cut off from the happiness of God because they chose to love themselves more than they loved God.

But God still loved the people so much that He sent His Son, Jesus, to save the people from their sins. Now we just need to choose to believe in Jesus, and to love Him. As today's Gospel reading says, "...so must the Son of man be lifted up, that whoever believes in Him may have eternal life."

How can we turn to Jesus so that we can be saved from our sins?

Here are a few things that can help you a lot:

- 1. When you wake up in the morning, tell Jesus that you are offering everything that happens today to Him.
- 2. Every day look at a crucifix (a cross with Jesus on it.) Think about how much Jesus loves us. How much do we love Him back?


# Adoramus te O Christe Taize Chant
