READINGS FOR SUNDAY

March 24, 2024

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

First Reading: Mk 11:1-10 or Jn 12:12-16 Second Reading: Is 50:4-7 / Phil 2:6-11 Gospel: Mk 14:1-15:47 or 15:1-39

FOCUS: Christ became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

During his journey to Golgotha, Jesus goes from hailed hero to crucified criminal. He surrenders out of obedience to his Father and love for us. As followers of Jesus, we, too, can face loss and sacrifice. Jesus knows what it means to sacrifice out of love. We journey together through loss, never alone, but always united with Jesus.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the Gospel for the procession, Jesus enters Jerusalem amid an enthusiastic crowd. In the first reading, Isaiah speaks for the Lord, despite opposition. In the second reading, Paul writes to the Philippians that Jesus emptied himself, becoming obedient to the point of death. Mark's Gospel tells the story of Jesus' passion and death.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

An approach to Jesus' Passion occurred to me while reading an article on, of all things, the field of Artificial Intelligence. In "Elegant Simplicity' and the Art of Distillation," online blogger David Shapiro describes a process of organizing knowledge and ideas so as to make them easier to understand, apply, and teach to others. It involves "isolating" the most important aspects of a concept, eliminating anything that is not absolutely essential to it, and concentrating it so as to render it clearer or more persuasive. Catholic theologians, like Bernard Lonergan, proposed a more complete explanation of this notion decades ago, but this suffices for our purposes today.

I confess: St. Mark's gospel is the one to which I have perhaps the least natural affinity. St. Matthew gives us a beautiful infancy narrative, a Torah-like structure to Our Lord's words and deeds, and

numerous Old Testament references; St. Luke's style is the most "elegant," and the one that emphasizes the mercy and kindness of Jesus; St. John dramatically emphasizes Jesus' knowledge and power. Of course, this is all a matter of degree; all four accounts of Jesus' life contain every one of these elements. But perhaps St. Mark's is the best choice for me to read precisely because of what is *not* in it: long discourses, an atmosphere of divine serenity amidst upsetting circumstances, and a strong, if not entirely consistent faith development among the crowds and Our Lord's disciples. Whoever wrote the lyric "Jesus walked this lonesome valley; he had to walk it by himself..." must have been reading St. Mark. The extended sermons of Matthew and Luke, and the last supper discourses of John, are not found in Mark. Instead, St. Mark's Jesus is constantly upbraiding his disciples for their lack of faith: even after his resurrection! He is so distressed by the people's lack of faith in Nazareth (Mk 6:5) that he "could work no miracles there." The abandonment of his disciples in the garden is so complete that when the guards lay hands on them, one young man runs away naked just to escape arrest! Unlike the other narratives, which record both his gracious words and deeds on the cross, Mark shows Jesus before he dies "uttering a loud cry" (15:37), that is, incoherently. And according to the original ending of the Gospel, the three women run away from the tomb frightened by the angel, saying nothing to anyone. End of story.

Since scholars believe that St. Mark's was the earliest account to be written, we might respond that, instead of the evangelist concentrating the essence of the remaining gospels in his narrative, that the others "diluted" his version. Perhaps. But this is beside the point; each writer operates out

of his own theological perspective, in which case the added material is vital to the other accounts. Still, it seems to me that Mark's Passion demonstrates an elegant simplicity that is especially compelling in its own way; he excludes every detail that could distract us from the core of Christian faith. Jesus, the Messiah and herald of the Kingdom of God, reveals his divinity, not in a show of glory and triumph, but in the ignominy of the cross and the rejection of sinful men. Likewise, the disciple faces a stark decision: embrace the cross of Christ, not for future praise or power, but in order to live in perfect obedience to the Father. The cross alone is the entrance to eternal life (Mk 8:34-35).
