The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

“Gravity: it’s not just a good idea: it’s the LAW!” So reads my favorite T-shirt. It’s funny, of course, because most people think of “law” as a rule that we can choose to follow...or ignore. The laws of physics, however, *must* be obeyed, no matter what we think about them. And so, I can say that I choose not to “obey” the law of gravity, but if I jump out of a 5-storey window on the assumption that I have a choice, I’m in for a hard landing.

Such is the essence of “natural law,” which is central to Catholic ethics. It means that God’s will is imprinted within the very structure of his creation, from material things to living beings, and finally, to the human person. In the case of the material world, there is no such thing as “choice”: the planets orbit the sun because *that’s what they do*. As the song goes, “Fish gotta swim and birds gotta fly...” But when it comes to human beings, natural law means that we are intrinsically rational and social; we do have a choice, because we can discern moral principles of right and wrong, applying reason to human behavior, and discovering how voluntary actions affect human flourishing. As I have mentioned before, natural law thinking is fundamental to the founding documents of the United States, specifically that “all men are created equal, and are endowed with unalienable rights...including life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.” This is certainly compatible with Catholic morality, but a distinction must be made. I have often cited Charles Taylor, the Catholic philosopher, on the subject of secularism, which has been developing since before the Enlightenment. The Catholic view is that Natural Law requires people to observe stable principles they discover in nature.



Secular society, however, even when it recognizes the existence of God—operates on a different basis. John Locke (who influenced Thomas Jefferson), believed that the human being is a *tabula rasa*—a blank slate—that government can shape, even “re-make”—in order to “maintain peace and civility among its *diverse* and potentially rival agents.” (It is worth noting Taylor’s observation that this way of thinking developed at a time when Catholic-Protestant tensions ran high.)

Does that word “diverse” ring a bell? It presently underlies almost every discussion of public morality, education, and government. It presumes that there is no such thing as “objective” truth—

truth as such—but rather *your* truth or *my* truth or *his* truth or *her* truth. It leads to the notion that authorities may legitimately impose pressure upon individuals to accept practices that violate nature: and, when it chooses, to endorse contradictory practices just as easily. Consider the ramifications of this view for a proper understanding of the human being, the family, the sexes, and how we understand good and evil. Cultures may influence the minds of its citizenry to devalue certain segments of the population. This begs the question: can the stroke of a pen change human nature? The real result is the splintering of societal cohesion. The Church, however, teaches the opposite. We take our cues from nature, not the other way around, in which case reason, not emotion or personal ideology, binds us to a clear, intelligible, and common set of moral principles. Let us pray that we may always seek the truth in whatever way it manifests itself, and lovingly put it into practice.

READINGS FOR SUNDAY

April 14, 2024

3rd Sunday of Easter, Sunday of Divine Mercy

First Reading: Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

Second Reading: 1 Jn 2:1-5a

Gospel: Lk 24:35-48

FOCUS: [We] look forward to the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promises of salvation, and he has come to save us – body and soul. Our physical and spiritual realities are infused with one another, integrated within our creation as Imago Dei – made in the image of God. Christ was raised, body and soul, by the Father, and his glorified body was seen by the Apostles and many others. Through him we will be reunited to God, our Father and Creator, on the last day. As we profess in our creed, we look forward to the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: In the first reading, Peter witnesses that Jesus, who was handed over out of ignorance, was raised from the dead and is the fulfillment of the prophets. In the second reading, John exhorts his community not to commit sin and to keep God's commandments. In the Gospel, Jesus appears to the disciples, shows them his hands and feet, and eats in front of them.



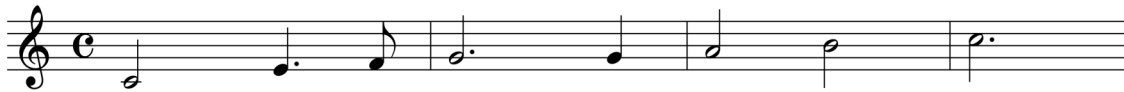


