First Reading: Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48

<u>FOCUS</u>: Love one another; the commandment is not always easy to follow, but it is always good.

Jesus commands us to love one another. As he laid down his life, we imitate Jesus in laying down our lives and loving others. The command, though difficult, comes with a purpose and promise: We remain in him and our joy will be complete. We can love others and bear fruit in Christ, if we remain firmly rooted to him.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

John writes, Beloved, let us love one another, because love is of God. God's love was revealed in his Son whom he sent for our salvation. THE PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends:

We've all heard reports that by July, Americans should regain our ability to move about the nation. This will be happy news for so many families, especially those with children who have felt cooped up for the better part of 1½ years. Of course, travel can be costly and arduous, but it is difficult to overestimate the benefits that accrue to those who get on the road. Whether camping under the stars, or visiting the National Parks, or exploring entirely new cultures beyond our borders, travel can be fun, educative, and exciting. Over the course of years, we also discover how *important* it is to leave familiar surroundings; appreciating life from a different perspective promotes virtue and uproots vice. The novelist Gustave Flaubert remarks that travel humbles people, because "you see what a tiny place you occupy in the world." Mark Twain writes that travel is "fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness." And the American essayist Henry David Thoreau suggests that "not until we are lost do we begin to understand ourselves." In a word, travel epitomizes human life: advancing from the possible to the actual, adjusting to fresh circumstances, and meeting new challenges. That said, coming back refreshed and renewed also has its value. Paris may be beautiful, but there is nothing like heading east on the Northern State Parkway (without traffic, of course).


Life-as-journey is a particularly apt metaphor of the spiritual life as well; Christians see themselves as pilgrims on this earth, making their way to the Kingdom of God. For a privileged few, the trip is comfortable and secure. For most, however, it is more of a slog, with unforeseen difficulties and little comfort. Nevertheless, whether we wander the world or go no farther than our own backyards, human beings enjoy a unique dignity within creation. For Catholicism, the universe is the free act of God who communicates his love and wisdom in something other than himself: i.e. creation (a process St. Thomas calls *exitus*). In turn, God wills that all creatures realize their ultimate purpose by returning to him: i.e. salvation, (or *reditus*). You and I have one foot in the material world through our bodies, but unlike other earthly creatures, we can think and act freely. As such, we have the responsibility to "give voice" to lower beings, acting as God's representatives among them. And unlike angels who have intellect but no bodies (and so cannot change), human beings set out on an adventure: to grow, to flourish, and to draw ever closer to perfection. Our winged friends may be higher on the Great Chain of Being, but God paid us, the poor banished children of Eve, the compliment of becoming one of us in Christ.

Our artwork this week is the famous labyrinth of Chartres Cathedral in France. The circle, of course, is a time-honored figure of completeness and perfection. According to the Loyola University Medieval Studies website, the central image, a "six-lobed rosette," is an ancient symbol of God. At Chartres, the labyrinth evokes the Christian belief in Christ's Descent into Hell to conquer Death before ascending to God's right hand. Those who trace the maze interpret it as an analogy of our earthly sojourn to God.

Speaking for myself, I've always been baffled by the demotion of St. Christopher, the patron saint of travelers, in the Church's veneration of the blessed. May he pray that we embark upon a safe, joyful pilgrimage through life, and find our way home to God.

Processional Hymn O Sanctissima








Communion Hymn: Make Your Home in Me
