Please notify the Rectory and Human Concerns Ministries if there is anyone seriously ill so that we can provide spiritual care.



READINGS FOR SUNDAY

May 21, 2023 7th Sunday of Easter

First Reading: Acts 1:12-14 Second Reading: 1 Peter 4:13-16

Gospel: John 17:1-11a

FOCUS: Give glory to God.

Today's Liturgy of the Word offers insight into what it means to glorify God. It is not about just praising occasionally with words, but rather, it is about glorifying God with our lives. What we say and what we do ought to glorify God every day. Jesus has shown us this way by his very life, from his public ministry to his passion and resurrection.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the reading from the Acts of the Apostles, the first disciples return to Jerusalem after witnessing the Ascension, and devote themselves to prayer. In the second reading, Saint Peter counsels those who face persecution that they will be glorified by God. In the Gospel, Jesus prays to the Father as his hour has come. He describes how everything he has done on earth has been for the Father.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

The approach of senior citizenship has required me to make a few investments, one of which is a pair of "transitional" eyeglasses, the kind that adjusts depending upon the intensity of the sun. Strange, isn't it, that too little or too much light has the same effect: blindness. The risk of losing one's sight strikes terror in the hearts of human beings, particularly the elderly, for whom it portends a loss of connection with the outside world. But for Catholics, the deliberate choice of another, holy Darkness signals a communion with God that transcends the senses and the intellect. Medieval mystics compare this sacred "gloom"—a relationship with God that goes beyond "mere" reason with marriage. Evelyn Underhill, a spiritual writer, calls this the "night of the intellect, into which we

are plunged when we attain to a state of consciousness which is *above* thought; enter on a plane of spiritual experience with which the intellect cannot deal." Saints do not "leave their mind at the door," as it were; rather, they discover a reality that is beyond what the mind can

understand, what words can describe. The anonymous author of the *Cloud of Unknowing* writes of this encounter by noting that God ultimately sends out a

beam of ghostly light, piercing this cloud of unknowing that is between you and him; and shows you some intimacy...which man cannot speak. Then shall you feel your affection inflamed with the fire of his love, far more than I can tell you...

This past Thursday, the Church celebrated the Ascension of the Lord, while other dioceses celebrate it today. In the Acts of the Apostles (1:9), we read that after commissioning the Twelve to act as his witnesses throughout the world, Jesus "was lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight."

Further, we hear that after Jesus goes up to heaven (Luke 24:52) they "returned to Jerusalem with great joy." Some readers, including Pope Benedict XVI, wonder whether the disciples' elation is counter-intuitive. Shouldn't parting from a loved one be an occasion of mourning? It would be, he says, if we were speaking of an earthly departure, in which time and space prevent physical communion among the parties. The Ascension, however, is not a matter of physical space. The Pope writes:

"Ascension" does not mean departure into a remote region of the cosmos but, rather, the continuing closeness that the disciples experience so strongly that it becomes a source of lasting joy. The cloud presents Jesus' departure, not as a journey to the stars, but as his entry into the mystery of God.

The paradox is that, only by "leaving" us, Jesus becomes infinitely closer to us in his real, sacramental presence. Notice the

imagery in Pacino di Bonaguida's iluminated page, *The Ascension of Christ*, in which the resurrected Lord is enveloped in the almond-shaped halo (*mandorla*) as he ascends to heaven. The gold light surrounding Jesus and the light-colored outer leaves of the *mandorla* become progressively muted, then darker. Likewise, as believers enter more deeply into the mystery of Christ, they rely less and less upon obvious sources of wisdom—e.g. facts, information—and more upon the "theological virtues" of faith, hope, and love. On this Ascension, let us accept the Lord's invitation to enter this holy darkness, and there find in him the object of our deepest longing.



- 7. When Jesus comes back, He will return in the same sort of way as how He left. True or False?




Confirmation Highlights


