READINGS FOR SUNDAY
June 23, 2024
12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Jb 38:1, 8-11
 Second Reading: 2 Cor 5:14-17
 Gospel: Mk 4:35-41

FOCUS: God’s love for us is more powerful than any challenge we face.

The readings today reflect God’s profound love for us, even in the face of turbulent times. When our faith is challenged or we are distraught, we must trust that God is with us always and have complete faith that his love is more powerful than the storms of our lives.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: In the first reading, the Lord speaks to Job out of the storm and reminds Job of the divine power that has protected him. In the second reading, Saint Paul reflects that the love of Christ has brought about a new way of life. In the Gospel, a violent storm comes up as Jesus and his disciples are in a boat. Jesus calms the storm and then asks the disciples, Do you not yet have faith?

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

Years before my arrival in England to work with the Jesuit community at the University of Manchester, I had already been a fan of one of its celebrated graduates—and later, professor—the philosopher Alasdair MacIntyre. He was wonderful antidote to the academic hubris of his time: blindingly brilliant, exceedingly well-read, and an insightful diagnostician of intellectual snobbery. While he was a well-published (*After Virtue*) and in-demand speaker, he never received a Ph.D., remarking that such credentials are nothing more than a certification that a student has successfully regurgitated the ideas and prejudices of his own teachers. (He has a point!) More importantly, MacIntyre was an indefatigable seeker of truth, who began as an atheistic socialist only to become a devout, Catholic “virtue ethicist,” a journey that confounded his colleagues. I admire people like him, who refuse to kowtow to the prevailing ideological and ethical winds blowing through a culture.

On this side of the pond, a similar figure (though I don't know his religious leanings) is Christopher Lasch, the American historian who wrote a groundbreaking—and controversial—book: *The Culture of Narcissism*. As with MacIntyre, he is cited by everyone, from radical theorists to traditionalists, who praise his call for the recovery of “the family: a haven in a heartless world.” He believed that many aspects of the American experience advance a sinister form of “self-absorption.” Exaltation of the individual replaces religion, while progress in science and technology leaves us isolated and impotent. “We demand too much of life, and too little of ourselves.”

This week, the Church celebrates the Birth of St. John the Baptist. The great St. Augustine notes that John is the only figure, outside of Our Lord and

Our Lady, whose birth is commemorated in the liturgical calendar. For Augustine, John is a kind of “hinge” figure, a prophet who stands between the close of the Old Testament, and Jesus in the New. He compares various aspects of the births of the Savior and his cousin: John was born to an older, barren woman, and the news of his birth was met with doubt, while Jesus was born to a young virgin, and his advent was met with faith. Indeed, something unprecedented was coming in Jesus, while John eschewed the praise—even the attention—of the world. He knows who he is: a mere man who receives a heavenly message, and while he rejoices in the wedding of the groom, he is only the groom's friend, nothing more; and for this reason, John says (Jn 3:30): “He must increase, and I must decrease.”



It is therefore fitting that I take leave of dear St. Mary's on the Feast of the Birth of John the Baptist. Given that his birthday comes exactly six months before that of Our Lord, we observe the sun's prominence begin to wane over the coming months. So too, every pastor who bids his congregation farewell must follow John's example, to point away from himself to the only reality that matters: the presence of Christ in our midst. Heaven knows that I have made mistakes over the past 5+ years: some of them real whoppers. I hope, however, that you'll forgive my limitations as those of a well-meaning if imperfect vessel. It is a unique privilege to have been your pastor, both in good times and in bad. I trust you will be no less gracious to my successor, Fr. Geoffrey, as you have been to me. God bless you all.
