Please notify the Rectory and Human Concerns Ministries if there is anyone seriously ill so that we can provide spiritual care.



READINGS FOR SUNDAY

June 25, 2023

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Jeremiah 20:10-13 Second Reading: Romans 5:12-15 Gospel: Matthew 10:26-33

FOCUS: What I say to you in the darkness, speak in the light; what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops.

Saint Paul tells us that Jesus brings the grace of God as pure gift. And we know that God cares for us so much that he counts the hairs on our heads. Nothing is secret with God – all is finally and perfectly revealed in his Son, Jesus. We ought not fear to share this Good News, acknowledging Christ and announcing the Gospel to the world.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: Jeremiah fears turbulent times and impending siege, but also trusts in God. Saint Paul writes to the Romans that sin entered the world through Adam, but redemption through Jesus overflows all the greater to save everyone. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples to fear no one, and that all who acknowledge him he will acknowledge before the Father.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

As I write these words, a desperate search is underway in the North Atlantic Ocean for five men in a submersible that lost contact with its mother ship while on an underwater tour of the Titanic. A hopeful sound was just heard this morning: a constant banging around the area of the shipwreck, suggesting that the crew might still be alive. When I read about this, I was reminded of the motto of St. John Henry Newman from Psalm 42:7: "Deep calls unto deep." (Or "heart calls unto heart.") Some messages, particularly those about life and love, are too profound for mere words. They beat, like the beat of the heart, in the

depth of our soul. God bless these men.

This past Sunday we were honored by the visit of our Ordinary, Bishop John O. Barres, and his message about

devotion to the Sacred Heart, especially during the month of June. He mentioned the most ardent devotees to the Sacred Heart of Jesus suffered greatly throughout their lives, both physically and spiritually. As we have discussed in these pages several times, the two figures most closely associated with devotion to the Sacred Heart—Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque and Blessed Claude la Colombiere—practiced severe forms of penance out of love for Christ crucified. Claude, in particular, went the extra step by serving the Catholics in England at a time faith was when the banned and practitioners were subjected to imprisonment and death.

Upon his return to the Jesuit community of Paray-le-Monial, France, where he was the trusted spiritual director of Saint Margaret Mary, Claude wrote of the tremendous spiritual gifts and blessings that accrue from the acceptance of suffering for love of Christ. The point is not that one can work up a tolerance for physical or emotional pain, or even develop a psychological "escape" from the torment one experience. On the contrary, Claude learned from his many trials the virtue of trust: trust in Christ, and in him alone. He was convinced of the Biblical truth that no one who hopes in the Lord will be

confounded (Ps. 25:1). To put our confidence in anything short of the living God is to put our faith in what is corruptible and sure to disappoint. The love of Christ pouring forth from his Sacred Heart helps us look beyond the changeable world to the Kingdom

of Heaven where all desire will be satisfied.

As the circumstances of the men trapped in the Atlantic testify, one day we all will face the specter of death, and in the meantime we do well to accept the challenge of placing our trust wholly in the Lord. As the experience of Catholics attests, this happens more frequently in circumstances of loss than in times of victory. May God fortify us through our trials with the gift of faith.


