READINGS FOR SUNDAY

September 10, 2023 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Ezekiel 33:7-9 Second Reading: Romans 13:8-10 Gospel: Matthew 18:15-20

FOCUS: Jesus is present when we gather together and love one another.

The liturgical gathering makes Christ present in numerous ways, such as through the proclamation of the word of God and in the Eucharist. Perhaps the most overlooked reality of Christ's presence comes through the physical gathering of God's people, who are instructed to owe nothing to anyone except love. This love between us makes God presence visible on earth.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: Ezekiel, in today's first reading, is appointed watchman to guide his people in the ways of the Lord. In the second reading, Paul describes to the Roman Church how love fulfills the entire law and satisfies every commandment. The Gospel includes Jesus' instructions for navigating conflict and correcting those who sin. He concludes by saying that he is present when people gather in his name for prayer.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

I'm here on the ground with my nose in it since the whole thing began. I've nurtured every sensation man has ever been inspired to have. I cared about what he wanted and I never judged him. Why? Because I never rejected him, despite all his imperfections... I'm a humanist, maybe the last humanist. Who in their right mind, Kevin, could possibly deny the 20th century was entirely mine? ALL of it, Kevin! ALL of it!

So argues Satan (Al Pacino) to his son, Kevin (Keanu Reeves), in the 1997 film, "Devil's Advocate." He has a point, albeit a twisted one. God, who gives us "instinct" to follow our natural urges, forbids us to act upon them, and so torments us by an inner contradiction, all for his own amusement. The Devil, however, encourages us to

indulge our instinct; after all, what could be more natural, more reasonable, more... humanistic? In fact, Satan "takes credit" for the war, carnage, suffering, excess, and uncontrolled passions that comprise the last century, as if it were a noble accomplishment. A jury might be tempted to find in his favor; he makes sense! That is, if

one accepts the premise that the human being is simply an animal, that to care for is to coddle, that restraint is oppression. Even today, the wise of the world confuse evil with apparent good. And so, might makes right, decadence is desirable, and love is for losers.

On September 14, the Church celebrates the Triumph of the Cross, to commemorate the day in 327 AD when St. Helena, the mother of the Emperor Constantine, discovered the True Cross of Christ in a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. A Basilica was erected on the site seven years later. The Cross is, of course, the central paradox of Christianity, one that only faith can grasp:

For the message of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? [For] we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to

Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. (1 Cor. 1: 18, 23-24)

Today's artwork is Salvador Dali's "Christ of St. John of the Cross." The artist is contemplating a world that has entered the nuclear age, with both its benefits and dangers. He writes:

In 1950 I had a 'cosmic dream' in which I saw in colors an image which in my dream represented the NUCLEUS OF THE ATOM.' This nucleus later took on a metaphysical sense that I considered 'the unity itself of the Universe' the CHRIST! S.D" When, thanks to the instructions of Father Bruno (a Carmelite), I saw the Christ drawn by Saint John of the Cross, I geometrically decided upon a triangle and a circle, which 'aesthetically' summed up

which 'aesthetically' summed u all my previous experiences."

Looking down on Our Lord and the world for which he died, we see a triangle (the Trinity) formed by Jesus' arms and feet, and a circle (eternity), by his head. These signify what lies beyond the historical event of the crucifixion. We behold, not a

realistic portrait of an historical event, but a serene, God's-eye view of His Son. In the eyes of the world, the Cross is disaster and defeat. The Christian, however, beholds Our Savior from the divine perspective, where (as St. Augustine would say), Jesus is:

beautiful in heaven and on earth, beautiful in the womb and in His parents' arms, beautiful in His miracles and under the scourges, beautiful as He invited us to life, and in not shrinking from death, beautiful in laying down His life and in taking it up again, beautiful on the cross, in the tomb, and in heaven.






