READINGS FOR SUNDAY

September 24, 2023 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Isaiah 55:6-9

Second Reading: Philippians 1:20c-24, 27a

Gospel: Matthew 20:1-16a

FOCUS: God rewards generously those who place

their trust in him.

In the Gospel, the workers hired first entered into a legal contract with the owner. Those hired later were promised what is just. They trusted in the owner's concept of "just." Those hired last weren't promised anything, yet they went to work. The landowner was generous to all who labored for him, giving to all what he chose to give.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: Isaiah proclaims that God's ways are above our ways, and his thoughts are above our thoughts. Saint Paul writes that he longs to be with Christ, yet wishes to remain on earth to minister in his name. The Gospel passage tells of the vineyard owner who hired laborers throughout the day and yet paid them all the same.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

Much has been said of Pope Francis' remarks to a gathering of Portuguese Jesuits concerning "reactionary, backward" thinking Catholics, particularly those in the United States. It's worth noting that America Magazine, hardly a bastion of conservative thought, wonders why the Holy Father "criticizes fellow Catholics, especially if he isn't going to name them." I'm not sure what to make of all this, but whatever may you think about the Church in the U.S., one thing is sure. Without the financial support of American donors, the theological centers in Rome would collapse overnight. For a backward thinking Church, we tend to be rather generous!

This week the Church honors St. Jerome (340-420 AD), perhaps the greatest Scripture scholar in Christendom. In past years, we've discussed his

towering intellect, as well as his somewhat dissolute formative years, and his conversion to Christ that inspired a life of penance, asceticism and prayerful scholarship. Jerome's slightly younger contemporary, St. Augustine, reported a similar debauched youth and transformation. The latter, who yielded to Jerome in Biblical

matters, would himself become the greatest, not to mention the most voluminous, of the Church Fathers. Although the two never met, they maintained a lively—some might say contentious—correspondence, one that is instructive for Catholics today. The following is an example.

St. Paul's Letter to the Galatians is an important text concerning the relationship between the Mosaic Law and faith in Christ as the key to salvation. In short, Paul makes the case that the Law of Moses is indeed valuable, much like the servant of a household—the "pedagogue"—who accompanies the child to school, where he learns from the master teacher. Once the child is safely delivered, however, the servant's job is done. Likewise, the significance of the Law is that it brings us to Christ. Through faith in him we gain access to God. It is no longer necessary to follow all of the dictates of the Law-including circumcision and dietary restrictions—to find salvation. Both Jerome and Augustine approach the Scriptures with the presumption that the Bible

contains no error. Jerome, however, does not want to imply that either Peter or Paul would make any "wrong" decisions when running the Church. He suggests, therefore, that the two Apostles stage a pretend "quarrel." It was designed to respect the importance of the Law, and the place of the Jews within the community, while advancing the notion that faith in Christ, not the Law, is decisive for salvation. For Augustine, the suggestion of playacting was tantamount to denying the inerrancy of the Scriptures, and so he wrote to Jerome for clarification.

It might be hard for us to appreciate just how difficult it was for these two giants of 4th-5th-century Catholicism to maintain their dialogue about such matters. Obviously, they had none of the technology that we take for granted today. Letters were usually hand delivered by a trusted representative of the writer, and often had to be

copied in case they got lost or otherwise failed to reach their destination. Such was the case here. Augustine re-sent his letter, and wrote yet another; Jerome got wind of the younger man's missives being circulated in Rome, and took offense at the idea that he was being "talked about"—basically, gossiped about—

behind his back. After several misunderstandings on both sides over the course of several years Augustine, to reassure his older "mentor," subsequently apologized and reassured him that they were great friends: one heart beating in two bodies! While this summary does not do justice to the "back and forth" between the Bishop of Hippo and the monk from Bethlehem, as well as the hurt feelings they both experienced, the fact remains that they had profound respect for each other, and their conversations on the meaning of the Scriptures led them both to a deeper love for Christ. Would that mutual respect among Catholics, both individually and collectively, might typify conversations within the Church today. (Thanks to augnet.com for background info.)



Heaven is like this too: some people spend their whole lives working for God, and some people only turn to Him at the last minute. God opens


