The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

The year 2023 saw a number of professional athletes suffering from injuries that cut short their respective seasons: in football, Aaron Rogers (NY Jets), in tennis, Rafael Nadal, and in baseball, the Atlanta Braves (too many to count: what happened?!). We often hear the refrain "no pain, no gain" as they make their way to recovery and ultimately return to the spotlight on the "fields of friendly strife."

It would be difficult to describe adequately the horrific suffering that St. Isaac Jogues (1607-1646), whom the Church honors this week, endured for the sake of Christ. The Catholic Encyclopedia tells us that he spent his earlier career teaching literature, and was later sent to the missions of Canada. (He is thought to be the first Catholic priest to set foot on Manhattan Island.) After years of hunger, deprivation, and danger as he advanced further and further into the interior, he was eventually brought to

a village of the Mohawks in what is now Auriesville, NY, only to subject himself to bodily mutilation and torture. He owed his life to the efforts of Dutch Protestants who rescued him and sent him back to France to recover. While there, he was welcomed by his community and nation, and was referred to—in his lifetime—as a martyr of Christ by

Pope Urban VII. Moreover, because his hands were maimed so badly, he would have been prevented from celebrating the Liturgy. The pope waived the canonical regulation, and Isaac returned to North America to continue his work. Having made peace with the Native Americans, he attempted to extend his outreach to other tribes. An outset of disease among the people was subsequently attributed to Isaac as evidence of magic, and he was killed following a series of tortures.

Speaking for myself, I cannot even imagine what it demanded of St. Isaac to withstand the sufferings he did. The Age of the Missions is an example in modern times, of what we might call "muscular Christianity." It represents a form of discipleship so grueling and dangerous that only a tiny group of individuals could even be sent for the task, much less attain it. Still, we must make a few distinctions here. First, it is never the intention of the martyr to take any life, whether his own or that of another. This would be proof either of hatred of others or contempt of self. Besides, the holiness of the act does not lie in the extent of suffering it entails. Physical suffering

can be embraced for many reasons, some noble, others pathological. Then what is it that makes St. Isaac Jogues' martyrdom not only noble, but, as St. Thomas Aquinas would call it, an act of "perfection"? The answer lies in the saint's letter to his French superiors as he writes about his motivation for staying in America to complete his mission:

My heart remained perplexed... wondering if it were not expedient for the greater glory of our Lord that I expose myself to the danger of the fire and to the fury of [his captors], in order to aid in the salvation of some soul...The reasons which might keep me in the country were consideration for the French and for the [Native Americans]; I felt love for them, and a great desire to assist them...

Here is our answer: love for God and love for one's

neighbor. St. Thomas Aquinas tells us: "Now, of all virtuous acts martyrdom is the greatest proof of the perfection of charity: since a man's love for a thing is proved to be so much the greater, according as that which he despises for its sake is more dear to him..." To extend the sports metaphor, it is not the "degree of difficulty" that


constitutes the perfection of martyrdom, but rather the intensity of love, which makes all the difference in the world. The Jesuit missionaries did not preach out of a sense of superiority to their converts. On the contrary, they believed so radically in the equality of Native Peoples before God, as to be convinced that they deserved the opportunity to respond to the call of Christ.

Christian martyrdom, in the wide sense, can take myriad forms: a wife's devotion to her husband who has lost his job, a parent's dedication to a child with a rare condition, an abused woman who provides a better life for her child than the one she had known, or the young people who harness all the abilities God gave them to spread the Good News of the Kingdom of Heaven as physicians, teachers, moms, a businessmen, artists, or priests.


Wednesday, October 18, 7 PM: Church - Prayer of the Liturgy
