## READINGS FOR SUNDAY

October 22, 2023 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Isaiah 45:1, 4-6

Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 1:1-5b

Gospel: Matthew 22:15-21

FOCUS: Let us build communities of peace and

justice.

Christ came to restore our relationship with God and one another: There is no God besides [him]. Christians cannot be content to lead prayerful lives in private. We have a right and a responsibility to build communities of peace and justice in our homes and nations.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: Isaiah reveals to King Cyrus of Persia that the Lord has called him by name so all may know there is no other God. Paul gives thanks for the Thessalonians' work of faith and labor of love and endurance in hope. Jesus tells the Pharisees they should repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.

# The Pastor's Page

#### Dear Friends:

What comes to mind when you hear the word "exhilaration"? It is defined as a feeling of happiness, elation, or excitement: a thrill. Personally, it makes me think of the opening images of ABC sports on Saturday, when we hear about the "thrill of victory and the agony of defeat." There is a perception of transcendence, an engagement with the world that goes beyond the ordinary experience of everyday life. I came across the word twice in as many minutes this morning. The Catholic philosopher Charles Taylor uses it to refer to what he calls the "wild side" of human existence: those moments that remain untamed, dangerous, and perhaps for that very reason, stimulating. Thrill seekers undergo an induced high by participating in activities or sports that are risky or threaten destruction, whether to themselves or others. In the ancient world, such a personality was linked with

the Dionysius (god of wine and debauchery), while the desire for order, reason, and self control was linked with Apollo (god of the sun and reason). Given the awareness—and fear—of our mortality, the way we deal with the wild side influences the quality and meaning of life. As for the second citing of "exhilaration": an

Ivy League professor, upon seeing the recent destruction and atrocities taking place in Middle East, remarked that it made him feel "exhilarated." Such an ignorant reaction to violence against innocent human beings is the sort of which only "academics" are capable.

One of the charges against organized religion is that it has inspired terrible acts of aggression, from holy wars to self-destructive forms of penance. One theory has it that Western culture has become more and more detached from a worldview in which the presence and influence of the divine played a central role. The older, religious mentality that was open ("porous") to the influence of the divine has been replaced by a hard wall ("buffered") between the sacred and the secular. In that case, any sense of the supernatural has taken on the quality of "magic," i.e. superstition. Taylor writes of this new sensibility:

And hence what was for a long time and remains for many the heart of Christian piety and devotion: love and gratitude at the suffering and sacrifice of Christ, ncomprehensible, or even repellant and frightening to many. To elebrate such a terrible act of violence as a crucifixion, to make this the centre of your religion, you have to be sick; you have to be perversely attached to self-mutilation, because it assuages your self-hatred, or calms your fears of healthy self-affirmation. You are elevating self-punishment, which liberating humanism wants to banish as a pathology to the rank of the numinous.


The question we religious folk might ask of those who dismiss our backward, pre-enlightened view of the world is: so how are things working out for

you? In this new world freed from the shackles of religious oppression, is civil discourse any more respectful and courte-ous? Public spaces any safer? The vulnerable defended? Young people more resilient? Private property protected? Admittedly, the older mentality may seem less sophisticated, but for what have we

traded it? To the modern mind, the human person is simply a collection of chemical and electrical impulses, human action is determined and predictable: none of it blameworthy because none of it is praiseworthy, either. The more responsible forms of religion grant that our outlook must be constantly purified of malign forces, but there is a certain humility in knowing that we are subject to any number of spiritual forces, both good and evil. Instead of being ourselves the "gods" who determine what is right and wrong, we kneel before a gracious and loving God. Our faith neither endorses nor rejoices in evil, but it has the spiritual components to give meaning even to violence and, by God's grace, subvert it for the purposes of salvation. Such is the Catholic view of the Cross of Christ.
