

**READINGS FOR SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 2020
ALL SAINTS-SOLEMNITY**

First Reading: Revelation 7:2-4, 9-14
 Second Reading: 1 John 3:1-3
 Gospel: Matthew 5:1-12a



FOCUS: We are all called to be saints.

Gathered at each Mass, we are like the crowd in today's Gospel, sitting at the feet of Jesus and seeking direction through his Word and spiritual nourishment through the Eucharist. Placing our hope in God and striving to lead virtuous lives, we look toward salvation and eternal life, and are reminded that we are all called to be saints

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the first reading, John relates his heavenly vision of salvation for God's chosen people. In the second reading, John writes that we are the children of God, and we have been called to place our hope in him. In the Gospel, Jesus preaches the Sermon on the Mount, reassuring his followers that the reward for those who live according to the new law will be great in heaven.

THE PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends:

In a classic moment from the sitcom “Frazier,” the fictional psychiatrist Dr. Frazier Crane advises a tortured millionaire who faces the “agonizing” question of what to name his fabulous new yacht: Lulubell or Intrepid. The good doctor responds by describing an electron microscope that produces images of the atom, what he calls the “infinitesimally minute building block of our universe.” He concludes: “Roger, if I were using that microscope right now, I *still* wouldn’t be able to locate my interest in your problem...”

Though not as well-stated, I have the same reaction to the poor little celebrity who has unimaginable wealth, and yet expects others to sympathize with him over his perceived victimhood. Oblivious to the suffering of mere mortals, he is desperately in need of our attention and support. “Get over yourself!” I shout (congratulating myself, of course, for not being nearly so shallow). Such narcissism is the opposite mindset of the saints. According to St. Bernard of Clairvaux, earthly honors hold no attraction for the saints, nor “does our devotion add the slightest thing to what is theirs. Clearly, if we venerate their memory, it serves us, not them.” The saints desire only God: the source of genuine—and enduring—happiness.

On the Solemnity of All Saints, the Church contemplates the men and women (and children) throughout history who to an extraordinary degree embody the life of grace, and can distinguish the vital from the trivial. They know that holiness is not the escape from reality; on the contrary, it is attention to the only thing that truly matters. Loving God first helps the saints love their neighbor best, for self-interest cannot influence them.

This week’s art work—“Coronation of the Virgin,” c. 1434-5—comes to us from the hand of Angelic Brother John, otherwise known as Fra Angelico. The painting is arguably more appropriate for August 15th than All Saints Day, but then again, Our Lady is surrounded by the heavenly court. According to the Uffizi Gallery where the painting resides, Fra Angelico combines the best of “old and new” artistic techniques. The Middle Ages emphasizes the “spiritual” outlook, sweeping up the viewer into the contemplation of God and the joys of heaven: in this case, symbolized by the gorgeous gold leaf. The Renaissance, by contrast, is more concerned with the realistic depiction of human beings, as demonstrated by detailed facial expressions and the illusion of three dimensions.

Notice too how the artist expresses the essence of sanctity: riveted concentration on our Lord. Yet true to the Renaissance, we notice various characters gazing out at us, as if to welcome us into the scene. One such character here is St. Dominic, founder of the Order of Preachers, to which Fra Angelico belonged. As I understand it, the Dominicans preach in order to share with ordinary believers the fruit of their contemplation. Dominic may well be saying to us: “Our home is your destiny. Come, share of the joy of heaven.” Will we accept the invitation?

Dear People of St Mary's,

Today we celebrate the Catholic feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. It recognizes two important historical events: the discovery of the True Cross by Saint Helena, the mother of the emperor Constantine and the dedication of the churches built by Constantine on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and Mount Calvary. The Cross reminds us of the sacrifice Jesus made for all mankind but as important it symbolizes that our faith conquers the darkness and through the Cross we all can achieve everlasting peace and fulfillment.

St. Mary's Cross that sat majestically atop the steeple of our beautiful Church is being replaced with an exact duplicate of the Cross that had faded into severe deterioration. The Cross Restoration Project is being spearheaded by fellow parishioners Matt Doherty, Ed Escoffier and John Dussel along with several others collectively known as the "Steeple People". Matt Doherty our resident restoration architect has put in countless hours designing the bracing foundation for the Cross, milling the Honduran mahogany to exact dimensions of the previous Cross and now setting up the new Cross for the wood staining and gold leaf applications. While much work has been accomplished to date, the Steeple People and more St Mary's volunteers have many more things to do before the new Cross can be raised.

Fr. Tim Valentine, our Pastor, has mentioned being approached by Parish members asking if we would accept donations to the Cross Restoration Project. We thought this would be an excellent idea for anyone who would want to be part of this important work for our Church. Any donation large or small will help defray the cost of materials and new electric infrastructure. All labor is completely voluntary and not compensated. Every donor to the Project will know their contribution is part of the illumination of the Cross for everyone to see. Today's feast Mass entrance antiphon says it best "We should glory in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, for He is our salvation, our life and our resurrection: through Him we are saved and made free."
