READINGS FOR SUNDAY
November 12, 2023
32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Wisdom 6:12-16
 Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 or 4:13-14
 Gospel: Matthew 25:1-13

FOCUS: Always be prepared to welcome Christ, for we know neither the day nor the hour of his arrival.

The Gospel parable reminds us to keep vigil for Jesus. It is easy to get distracted by the details of work, family life, and other responsibilities so that we forget the real purpose and mission of our lives. Let's each take a moment to contemplate how we can live out our vocation in life, readying ourselves for the Lord's coming.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: The first reading speaks of the attributes of wisdom, and the importance of the love of wisdom, as it is the perfection of prudence. In the second reading, Paul encourages people of faith to hold on to hope in the Resurrection. In the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable where five virgins were ready for the bridegroom and five were not. Those who were not ready missed out on the wedding feast.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

Her name was Dora Davidson; she was the nice Jewish lady who lived across the street from us when we lived in Amityville. Mom invited Mrs. Davidson to attend my first Mass in Setauket when I was ordained in 1985. Having never set foot in a Catholic Church in her life, she decided to adopt the “when-in-Rome” custom of the congregation. When they sat, she sat, when they stood, she stood, when they knelt, she knelt; and when they arose and got on line to approach the altar, so did she. I was a bit startled when Mrs. Davidson approached me on the communion line, and whispered that Catholics believe that the host is the Body of Christ. She nodded and kept walking. At the reception afterward, Mom and I apologized for not explaining the Catholic “standard operating procedure” before Mass; she told us not to apologize. “Timmy,” she said, “When you explained it to me, I just turned and went to the priest next to you, took a sip from the cup, and returned to my seat.” Mom and I looked at each other—stunned—and observed the corners of Mrs. Davidson’s mouth beginning to curl, then smile, then grin from ear to ear. “Just kidding,” she said. We burst into laughter. You can only truly laugh when you love someone like family.

Over the past month, I have given a lot of thought as to why the atrocities committed in Israel on October 7th bothered me so much. After much soul-searching, I have only one conclusion: I am the man I am in large measure due to the influence of the Jewish People. They were our friends in school. In the Three Villages, my Jewish classmates came from the families whose parents taught at Stony Brook University, and served in the University Medical Center, at Brookhaven Labs, and at Grumman. Sad to say, the Catholic boy destined for the priesthood always trailed them in Latin Class! They were my professors at Columbia University, my colleagues at Fordham University and the United States Military Academy, and fellow servicemen and women in the U.S. Army in the Iraq War. At every turn, my Jewish counterparts raised the bar to which I aspired, whether in the intellectual life, the practice of philanthropy, or simple human kindness.

In his brilliant book on Catholic worship (“The Spirit of the Liturgy”), Pope Benedict XVI explains the incalculable contribution of Jewish thought to Christianity. The paradigm for understanding human history would no longer be a cyclical one of endless repetition as it was with the pagan cultures in the ancient world, but one of linear progress, in which God intervenes, concretely, in the affairs of his people. The human family would grow deeper in their knowledge and love of God. Their worship would not consist of blood sacrifices (especially human ones) for the sake of placating an angry, dependent deity. Instead, it would be internal (Micah 6:8: “He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.”) Thus, care for creation and one’s neighbor (Leviticus 19:18) became the hallmark of a person’s piety. As a Long Islander, I can only stand in awe of the medical, philanthropic, and cultural legacy of the Jewish community, for the edification and cultivation of people from all walks of life.



For these reasons, I feel the moral obligation to speak out, not only against the horrific atrocities and violence perpetrated against the People of Israel, but, closer to home, the shocking resurgence of anti-Semitism and violence, which has now claimed at least one victim. While I can only speak for myself, I believe most people in our congregation feel that such hatred is directed, not only at “them”—the Jewish community—but, truly, against “us” as members of the same “extended” religious family. Moreover, as a graduate of Columbia University (PhD, ’00), I am heartbroken over the breakdown of civility, even—especially?— in our elite academic institutions.

Dora Davidson, whose name means “gift,” will ever remind me of the gifts I have received from the Jewish People. I offer these few, inadequate words with the hope that, as we weep with those who suffer so greatly today, we may one day laugh with them in the “peace of Jerusalem” (Ps. 122:6).

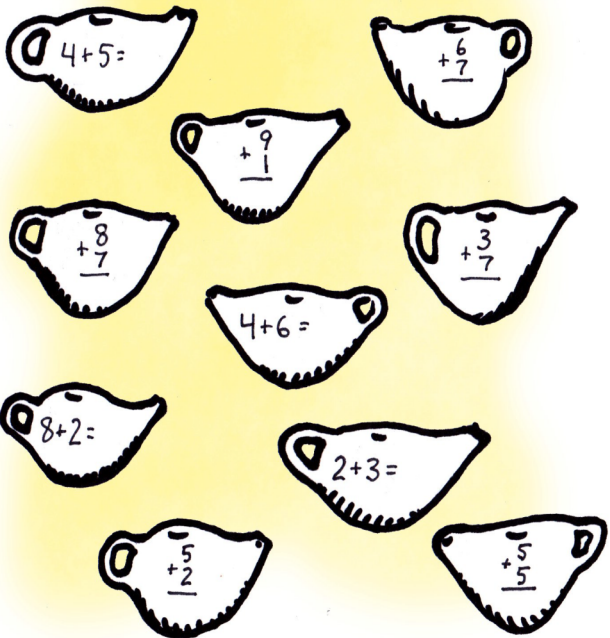


