READINGS FOR SUNDAY
November 19, 2023
33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31
 Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6
 Gospel: Matthew 25:14-30 or 25:14-15, 19-21

FOCUS: We are given talents to share.

The Lord has told us that he will come again at the end of time to judge the living and the dead. Though the timing is unpredictable, this end is inevitable and inescapable. Let us be prepared to give an account of the ways in which we have used our gifts for the benefit of others.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

The reading from Proverbs says that a worthy wife is a prize valued far beyond pearls. Paul tells the Thessalonians that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night or like labor pains, but that they are children of the light. Jesus tells a parable about three servants who were given talents. The first two servants multiplied their talents and were rewarded. The third servant buried his talent and was punished.

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

Those of you sufficiently unfortunate to have read this Pastor's Page in the past know that, to those who say, "I'm spiritual but not religious," I reply, "I'm religious, not spiritual." Such individuals think they are unencumbered by the dogmas and dictates of traditional Christianity. They fail to realize that "spirituality" without concrete conviction is a phantom without substance. Many align themselves with Abraham Lincoln, who once wrote:

When any church will inscribe over its altar, as its sole qualification for membership the Savior's condensed statement of the substance of both Law and Gospel, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbor as thyself," that church will I join with all my heart and all my soul.

Granted, our 16th President was not religious in the conventional sense, but neither was he a devotee of "spiritualism." In fact, one of his most famous quips was his response to a public lecture on that very subject. He is known to have said, "For those who like that sort of thing, that's the sort of thing they like."

Perhaps it is a good thing that Lincoln was not tied to a particular denomination. As his statement makes clear, he did believe that Christ *is* the Savior of the world—and therefore accepted the Christian message—but, for the sake of rousing a diverse nation to noble action, he adopted the moral teaching of Christ as of primary importance. I have to say that this is a welcome contrast to leaders who wear their Christianity on their sleeve, but abandon it when circumstances warrant it.

We American Catholics do well to heed the voice of the President, through whom our nation emerged

from a Civil War that was waged over, among other things, racial equality. Yet his was not a nameless, secular argument. As he states in his Second Inaugural Address, Lincoln believed that "slavery is one of those offenses which in the providence of God must needs come but which having continued through His appointed time He now wills to remove." Just as there are causes we ought not to fight over, so there are causes over which we cannot afford not to fight. The festering cancer of slavery and racism had to be resolved, without which our nation could not go forward, but always with an eye to restoring peace, "...with malice toward none and charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right."



Inasmuch as the Eucharist is the central act of worship for Catholics, we must appreciate the meaning of what we are doing. Sad to say, even today, people say at Thanksgiving, "I am thankful for X, and Y, and Z..." The word for "giving thanks"—εὐχαριστήσω—is a transitive verb; that is, we give thanks to someone.

The so-called "non-religious" President was quite comfortable, in his Thanksgiving Proclamation, to name the object of our thanks. There is only One responsible for our nation's "bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come," to say nothing of the peace and prosperity we enjoy. It is "the Most High God, who while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy." Times like ours, which see an alarming degree of racial hatred, remind us to submit ourselves to the Absolute, Infinite Reality: Almighty God. He alone will guide us through our difficult straits in which we find ourselves. To him alone do we give thanks.

When the master returned he rewarded the men who had used theirs, but punished the man who hadn't.



Some people have many talents and can do lots of good things. Other people can only do a few things well. But no matter what you can do, God wants you to do your best.



What are some things you're good at? What are some things you are not very good at? Rather than think about the things we can't do, we should be happy to do the things we can, and do them for God! Some people are good at drawing or writing. They can make people happy and teach people about God by drawing pictures or writing stories or letters. Some people are good at talking to people and making friends. They can show God's love and make people happy. Some people have a talent of being patient with others, and show Jesus' love that way. What are your talents? How can you use them to bring people closer to God?
